Founded in 1997, the mission of Providence is to partner with Christian parents in educating their children in the classical tradition, to think and act biblically, and to pursue academic excellence in joyful submission to the Lord Jesus Christ. Providence is accredited by The Association of Classical & Christian Schools (June 2004).

School & Community

Total enrollment for the 2022-2023 school year is 340. The high school has 66 students, 11 of whom are seniors. The average class size in the high school is 17.

Faculty

17 faculty members teach in our high school, with 49% holding post-baccalaureate degrees or certificates.

Curriculum

The liberal arts curriculum at Providence is modeled after the classical trivium of grammar, logic, and rhetoric.

Honors Courses

Honors courses are offered in the following high school courses: English, Latin, History, and Rhetoric. These require additional reading and writing (including summer work for some courses), additional assignments and assessments, and broader and deeper analysis and engagement in the subject matter. Students must meet specific prerequisites to be eligible for enrollment in honors courses.

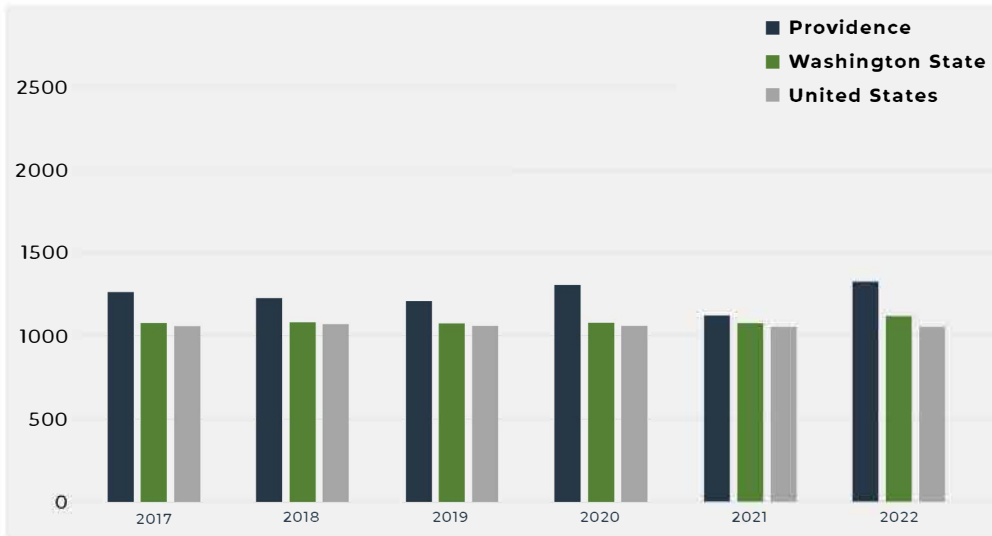
The following honors courses are available at Providence:

- Honors English (Grade 9, offered 2011-12 school year; grades 9-12, 2012-18, grades 10-12, 2018-present).
- Honors Rhetoric (Grades 11 & 12, offered 2012-13 school year to present).
- Honors Latin (Grades 9 & 10, offered 2012-13 school year to present).
- Honors History (Grade 11, offered 2018-19 school year to present).

Senior Thesis & Rhetoric

As a capstone to two years of Rhetoric class, all seniors write lengthy (15-18 page) Rhetoric thesis papers that address a political, cultural, or theological issue of controversy. Additionally, they must prepare a memorized oral presentation, consisting of a 15-minute speech and a 20-minute defense before a panel of faculty and expert adjudicators.

Additionally, of our 18 classes who have taken the PSAT examination, 18% of our students have been recognized under the National Merit criteria. As of the Class of 2021, 15 students have been Commended, 5 students have been Finalists, and 3 students have been awarded National Merit Scholarship status.

Providence School Life

Activities and Clubs

Providence has a robust student government, known as House Council, that plans student activities, peer-to-peer tutoring and student ministries/community service. Our athletic programs include soccer, volleyball, basketball, lacrosse, and track and field. Our Fine Arts program presents musicals and dramas, along with offering Honors Art, Honors Choir and Honors Band. We host and participate in various events throughout the year, including Protocol training (a manners and etiquette class and formal event), a Family Ball, and a European Grand Tour of Greece, Italy, and England. We also have a variety of student-led clubs, including: Math, Chess, Guitar, Art, Spanish, Ping-Pong, Trivia, Tea, and Spirit Club.

The Secondary House System

Providence implemented a House System for 7th to 12th grades, which replaces the traditional Student Government Association. Each house has representatives on the House Council. The House System consists of six houses and offers a means of service, activities, competition, and encouragement for our school and the entire Providence community. In each house, senior students have a special leadership role and help to facilitate the house events.

College Matriculation Rate for Providence

94% of our graduates have continued their education at the university or college level. Other Providence graduates have gone on to serve in the armed forces or to attend trade schools. Our 142 graduates have attended over 45 different colleges and universities. The cumulative average SAT scores by Providence seniors rank among some of the top high schools in the state.
